6	<i>Alyogyne huegelii</i>		Blue Hibiscus	Ok, I know we sometimes get a little carried away with our plant descriptions but this thing is just awesome! An evergreen shrub in the tropics, we grow it as an annual. Finely divided foliage looks a bit like some of the scented geraniums. But it's the stunning, purple/blue blooms that blow us away. Put this one in full sun either in a container or in the ground and be prepared to amaze your friends and neighbors.			
7	<i>Begonia</i>	Canary Wings	Dragon Wing Begonia	Stunning new annual with scarlet red flowers and bright yellow foliage. Best protected from hot afternoon sun			
8	<i>Begonia</i>	Gryphon	Pegasus™ Begonia	Big leaves and a bold look. Nearly 12" wide leaves at maturity this plant is an amazing container plant in those afternoon shady spots!!!			
9	<i>Begonia</i>	Art Hodes	Rhizomatous Begonia	Outstanding bold textured begonia with 8-9" diameter, leathery looking leaves. Small white flower in summer. This is an excellent container plant for shade.			
10	<i>Begonia odorata</i>	Alba	White Angel Begonia	The Angel begonias are great container plants or bed fillers in filtered light. Long, almost arrowhead shaped leaves are topped with delicate sprays of pure white blooms. For some reason the white one is hard to find but we love it for its clean simplicity in the garden.			
11	<i>Colocasia</i>	Black Sapphire Gecko	Elephant Ear	One of the best new forms from Louisville's own Brian Williams of Brian's Botanicals. This awesome tropical will grow to more than 4' tall with big, bold leaves of an almost black with almost an oil sheen surface. Tough to describe but easy to love! Growing 4-6' tall and wide, this is a stunning addition to any sunny site with plenty of moisture.			
12	<i>Cyperus alterniflorus</i>	Variegatus	Umbrella Sedge	Excellent 2' tall tropical with unique foliage texture and white/green variegated leaves. Great for the water garden or mixed border			

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13	<i>Cyperus papyrus</i>	King Tut	Egyptian Papyrus	Nothing like it! Emerald green umbrellas of fine textured foliage to 4' or more in height. Great for the water garden or for some unique texture in the mixed border			
14	<i>Ipomea</i>	NCORNSP-019SCSHLM	Sweetheart Lime Sweet Potato Vine	It is hard to beat an ornamental sweet potato vine if you like aggressive plants! Doing well in both a container or in the ground this plant will add that pop of chartreuse color to the garden and be a real workhorse when it comes to filling up some area!			
15	<i>Ipomea batatas</i>	NCORNSP-021SHJB	Sweetheart Jet Black Sweet Potato Vine	Despite the ridiculous variety name for this one, it might actually be one of the very best of the sweet potato vines. Deepest burgundy to black, heart shaped leaves on vigorous vines, this tropical is excellent in large containers or as a groundcover. Give full sun for best color. Simply stunning.			
16	<i>Lantana</i>	Purple Falls	Trailing Lantana	If you love Lantana but are looking for something a little different, here it is. Purple blooms on a plant with a creeping/trailing growth habit. Has the typical flower power, heat and drought tolerance and browse resistance. Works great in containers or as an edger. Incredible butterfly plant.			
17	<i>Lantana camara</i>	Balucraim	Lucky™ Flame Lantana	Lantana is legendary for its heat tolerance and ridiculous flower power, but this one ups the ante. Gone is the big, rangey growth habit, replaced with tight, compact plants up to about 15" tall and wide. This thing in full sun - either in the ground or in containers - flowers nonstop until frost. Good pollinator plant and is not bothered by browsing deer or rabbits.			
18	<i>Lantana camara</i>	Samantha	Lantana	Delightful mounding annual with green/gold variegated leaves and bright yellow flowers all summer long. Incredibly heat and drought tolerant			

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19	<i>Pennisetum</i>	Tift 8	Vertigo® Elephant Grass	Every once in a while a game changer plant arrives on the scene. For years there have been lots of burgundy foliaged, non-hardy grasses. But Vertigo is off the charts. From tiny spring plugs that we start under glass, this thing grows into an 8' tall x 6' wide arching mass of burgundy bodaciousness. Works as a screen plant, specimen, border back - heck, we've grown these in 36" diameter containers and used them for vehicular traffic control! Sun, nitrogen and water are all <u>that's needed.</u>			
20	<i>Pennisetum setaceum</i>	Rubrum	Fireworks Fountain Grass	Ok . . .now they've done it. Not only a burgundy foliaged grass but a burgundy and cream variegated form! This 3' tall non-hardy grass is an awesome plant to grow in a container or tuck among other perennials for a stunning color contrast. And if you're worried about seedlings next year, don't. This one is not technically sterile but our growing season isn't long enough to produce viable seed.			
21	<i>Plectranthus</i>	Nicolleta	Swedish Ivy	This stunning plant is a mounder/spreader that is clothed in screaming silver. Works well as a bedding plant or trailing over the edges of a large container. Looks great in full sun or light shade. Contrasts brilliantly with reds and burgundies.			
22	<i>Plectranthus scutellarioides</i>	UF12-22-1	Campfire Coleus	A favorite of our good friend and Louisville gardener Mary Anne Thornton, and we love it too! 3' tall masses of coppery red foliage with incredible heat tolerance and compact growth for sun or light shade.			
23	<i>Plectranthus scutellarioides</i>	UF04335	Electric Lime® Coleus	We have grown this one for a number of years and keep coming back to it. Grows to about 3' tall with medium sized leaves of bright green with screaming yellow veins. Excellent contrast plant that looks good all summer long.			
24	<i>Plectranthus scutellarioides</i>	UF16-91-25	Heartbreaker Coleus	Electric center, deep burgundy surround and a delicate rim of bright green on 2' tall plants. A great shot of color in containers or ground beds.			

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25	<i>Plectranthus scutellarioides</i>	UF0646	Redhead Coleus	The classic and still one of the very best. This coleus will grow to shrub proportions - 4' tall and wide, maybe even more. Deep, velvety red leaves hold up well all summer long. Simply stunning!			
26	<i>Plectranthus scutellarioides</i>	Balcovino	Vino Coleus	This 2 footer produces leaves of almost black burgundy color with a fine rim of bright green. An excellent contrast plant in containers or ground beds.			
27	<i>Portulaca oleracea</i>	KLEPO14824	Rio Grande™ Orange Purslane	A great annual for hanging baskets, containers or as a spreading bedder, the succulent green leaves contrast nicely with the brilliant orange flowers. Great for sun or light shade. Deer resistant. Good butterfly plant.			
28	<i>Rotheca myricoides</i>	Ugandense	Blue Glory Bower	Formerly a Clerodendron, this newly renamed species is a stunning, sky blue flowering plant for mixed containers or borders. Fresh, bright green foliage is tipped with stunning blue flowers all through the summer. There is simply nothing like it out there!			
29	<i>Salvia elegans</i>	Golden Delicious	Rockin® Golden Leaved Pineapple Sage	Brilliant yellow, pineapple scented foliage and scarlet, late summer flowers make this an outstanding tender perennial for the full sun garden. Excellent hummingbird plant			
30	<i>Strobilanthes dyerianus</i>		Persian Shield	Incredibly cool annual with purple and silver leaves. Best for full sun.			
31	<i>Torenia</i>		Grape-o-Licious™ Wishbone Flower	This crazy shade annual looks like the love child of a snapdragon and a pansy. Awesome blue flowers with yellow and white centers all season long. A great container plant for the front porch or in lightly shaded beds.			
32	<i>Xerochrysum bracteatum</i>	OHB003790	Dreamtime® Jumbo Yellow Straw Flower	The common straw flower now updated to great effect. Compact plants grow to about 12" tall and wide and are simply covered with bright, cheerful golden-yellow blooms from late spring through frost. Excellent cut, pollinator plant, container plant, edger . . . you name it!

Even without the fruit we love Paw Paw for its large, tropical looking leaves and the weirdly cool, deep mahogany colored flowers that are pollinated by flies!			
39	<i>Asimina triloba</i>	Mango	Paw Paw	An excellent, yellow fruited form of our most intriguing native trees. Usually found as an understory tree in the wild, Paw Paw actually grows, and flowers/fruits, much better in full sun where it makes a somewhat cone shaped tree with large, tropical looking leaves. "Mango" fruit is among the best flavored and earliest ripening.			
40	<i>Ficus carica</i>	Chicago Hardy	Chicago Hardy Fig	An old standard and one of the most winter hardy forms available on the market. Most winters this plant will die back to the ground in the Louisville area but grow back from the ground each year and still produce fruit.			
41	<i>Lonicera</i>	Kaido	Yezberry Honey Bunch® Fly Honeysuckle	Unique and easy to grow fruiting shrub that produces masses of deep blue, sweet and juicy fruit. Great for fresh eating or baking. Best in full sun to part shade			
42	<i>Vaccinium</i>	Corablue	Blueberry Buckle® Blueberry	A heavy fruiting blueberry variety selected for southern gardens. A compact variety, great for large containers.

54	<i>Cephalotaxus harringtonii</i>	Fastigiata	Japanese Plum Yew	One of the best evergreens for shade! This upright variety will be 10' or more at maturity but half the width. Full sun to shade.			
55	<i>Cryptomeria japonica</i>	Yoshino	Japanese Cedar	Excellent formal, conical evergreen with soft, billowy foliage. Vigorous grower that makes an excellent specimen or screen planting. 'Yoshino' is the most cold tolerant form out there and our favorite			
56	<i>Cryptomeria japonica</i>	Globosa Nana	Dwarf Japanese Cedar	This billowy, dwarf selection forms a broad rounded, dense mass of evergreen foliage up to 3-4' tall and wide			
57	<i>Cryptomeria japonica</i>	Cristata	Crested Japanese Cedar	Funky, weird and twisted . . . This 15' tall by 6' wide evergreen is for the gardener who has everything . . . Or wants everything. Unique texture and hard to find, it's foliage and branches are twisted, contorted and constricted into wild shapes. Excellent specimen for garden bed in full sun			
58	<i>Magnolia virginiana var. australis</i>	Perry Paige	Sweet Thing™ Sweetbay Magnolia	We have tried and tried and tried to find this one and are delighted to finally have it to offer. The typical native sweetbay is a great tree in its own right. Semi to evergreen leaves. Summer blooms of creamy yellow with a heavenly lemon scent. Fall fruit capsules of bright red. What's not to love? Sweet Thing takes that package and shrinks it down to a tight little offering that will fit in smaller spaces. Our oldest plant is about 12 year old and 8' tall. Fabulous!			
59	<i>Picea abies</i>	Gold Drift	Weeping Golden Norway Spruce	A weeping, twisted, mounding and creeping mass of bright yellow/gold needles. Amazing over boulders, on a slope or over a wall.			

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60	<i>Picea breweriana</i>	Inversa Form	Weeping Brewer's Spruce	An uncommon and hard to find upright weeper with incredibly graceful lateral branches and a reasonably strong central leader. Two tone needles give the overall appearance of a gray/green foliage. Beautiful texture. Sir Harold Hillier described <i>P. breweriana</i> as the most graceful and beautiful of all the conifers for the garden. Who are we to argue?			
61	<i>Platycladus orientalis</i>	Morgan	Oriental Arborvitae	Dwarfish selection with planar, upright sprays of bright chartreuse/gold foliage. Best for full sun			
62	<i>Sarcococca hookeriana</i>	SarSid2	Fragrant Mountain™ Sweet Box	Fabulous, low-growing groundcover/sub-shrub for shade. Makes an 8-12" tall mass of evergreen foliage with fragrant but inconspicuous green flowers in early spring			
63	<i>Sciadopitys verticillata</i>		Japanese Umbrella Tree	One of the coolest conifers out there! Slow growing, conical evergreen to about 40' eventually. But the real show is the needles. 4-6" long, lustrous green and uniquely textured give it the informal name of plastic pine. A gem of a plant			
64	<i>Thuja occidentalis</i>	Degroot's Spire	American Arborvitae	One of the narrowest of the arborvitaes out there - and it's been out there a long time. Will grow to about 15' or so with the classic, flat sprays of evergreen foliage. Widely adaptable and easy to grow. An excellent hedger, specimen plant or in an loose, informal grouping.			
65	<i>Thujopsis dolabrata</i>	Nana	False Arborvitae	We have no idea why everyone isn't growing this plant. Broad spreading shrub to about 3' tall and 5' wide over time, the branches are clothed in glossy, bright green scales with distinct white stripes beneath. It is durable, long lived and always looks great. Works well in beds or containers in full sun or light shade. Unique and impossible to find

72	<i>Athyrium</i>	Ghost	Ghost Fern	A Theodore Klein Award Winner! Fantastic 2'-tall clumping fern with silver/gray fronds. Well-behaved fern that doesn't take over the garden as others can. One of our favorites			
73	<i>Athyrium filix-femina</i>	Victoriae	Victoria Lady Fern	A 2' fern with a unique texture to the fronds. At first glance it looks like the leaflets are crisscrossed.			
74	<i>Athyrium niponicum</i> <i>var. pictum</i>		Japanese Painted Fern	A fern no shade garden should be without. 15" tall clumps spotted with white/silvery markings on a deer resistant plant. What's not to love?			
75	<i>Dryopteris complexa</i>	Robusta	Robust Male Fern	One of our best and easiest native ferns for the shade garden, this naturally occurring hybrid grows to 3' tall or more with gracefully arching fronds and relatively fine texture. It works nicely as a specimen plant or in masses in any shady site with adequate moisture. One of the ferns we always list as a good starter fern if you're just starting out.			
76	<i>Onoclea sensibilis</i>		Sensitive Fern	This medium textured fern forms 18" tall mounds of bright green foliage. It turns bright yellow at the first hint of frost giving it the "sensitive fern" name. Deer resistant, easy to grow and even works well in rain gardens.			
77	<i>Polystichum acrostichoides</i>		Christmas Fern	This is our most common native fern here in KY. Where it doesn't get a lot of points in the 'rare' category it sure gets a lot of points in the hard working category for the garden. At 1-2' tall this fern looks like the quintessential fern, BUT it is EVERGREEN! This fern mixed around the shade garden with some hellebores will keep the garden green all year!

85	<i>Acorus gramineus</i>	Ogon	Sweet Flag Grass	A fantastic little grass with brilliant chartreuse foliage. Not a great plant for hot, dry sites but does amazingly well in wet areas and even along a pond edge. Up to a foot tall and spreads slowly with age.			
86	<i>Bouteloua gracilis</i>	Blonde Ambition	Blue Grama Grass	Eyebrows are really popular right now! This grass is loaded with eyebrow looking blooms in July. In flower it stands 2-3 foot tall and is a perfect filler in the perennial garden!			
87	<i>Buchloe dactyloides</i>	Legacy	Buffalograss	Here is an interesting one! A 4-8" tall grass that is ideal for those areas you don't want to mow. It readily spreads, so mixed in the perennial planting is a no no. A contained area that needs turf is a perfect place for this grass native to the central United States. A dominant species in short grass prairies.			
88	<i>Calamagrostis</i>	Karl Foerster	Feather Reed Grass	The classic architectural grass - strongly upright to about 4-5' tall with late summer plumes of wispy flowers. Seed heads remain attractive all through the fall and winter. Full sun			
89	<i>Carex oshimensis</i>	Evercream	EverColor® Carex	We are continuously impressed by this Irish bred group of evergreen sedges. Excellent in sun or light shade beds or in containers, they produce 12-15" tall and wide, arching masses of glossy and colorful foliage. Evercream has a bright green central stripe with clear, creamy margins. It has performed beautifully in our evaluation garden.			
90	<i>Carex oshimensis</i>	Everoro	Evercolor® Variegated Sedge	Super little evergreen clumper with grass-like leaves edged in dark green and brilliant gold centers. Perfect for sun to part shade borders or containers			
91	<i>Cenchrus alopecuroides</i>	Hameln	Fountain Grass	Tidy little mound of fine textured foliage to about 12-15" tall for the full sun garden. Dainty plumes of flowers/seeds in late summer			

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92	<i>Equisetum hyemale</i>		Scouring Rush	We're not going to say this native plant isn't a little aggressive. Put it in a large container or contained planting bed. A little aggressiveness doesn't overshadow the fact that this plant has been around since the dinosaurs! A perfect plant for kids!!			
93	<i>Hakonechloa macra</i>	All Gold	Japanese Forest Grass	Stunning ornamental grass with brilliant yellow/gold foliage presented in arching masses 18" tall and 3' wide. Best in light shade but surprisingly sun tolerant for a gold foliated grass. One of our favorites			
94	<i>Juncus inflexus</i>	Blue Arrows	Blue Rush	Arguably one of the nicest "thrillers" for a mixed planter. The old fashion "spike" will be a thing of the past in your garden. Narrow and stiff leaf blades add a blue color to the garden in the ground or the container.			
95	<i>Muhlenbergia reverchonii</i>	PUND01S	Undaunted® Muhly Grass	The typical muhly grass (<i>M. capillaris</i>) can be maddingly touchy in the garden. It overwinters when it feels like it, but not when you feel like it! Undaunted is a great advancement in muhly for the garden. Fine textured, blue green foliage in mounds about 2' tall are topped in fall with clouds of pink. Native, durable and much more reliable, this one is great for any sunny garden with reasonably well drained soils.			
96	<i>Ophiopogon japonicus</i>	Torafu	Variegated Mondo Grass	Unique grass-like groundcover to about 8" tall with deep green foliage striped with cream. For sun or shade			
97	<i>Pennisetum alopecuroides</i>	JS Jommenik	Lumen Gold Fountain Grass	A July bloomer, this peach of a plant will only get a couple of feet tall when in flower. Fantastic chartreuse foliage provides color and texture when mixed in with a perennial garden.

107	<i>Asparagus verticillatus</i>		Vining Asparagus	No asparagus spears on the grill with this one. This is a fully cold hardy, ornamental vining asparagus that grows up to 15' tall! Talk about a conversation piece in the garden . . .give this one something to climb on or a wall to scramble over and enjoy. Light, airy foliage texture and clouds of fragrant white flowers in spring followed by masses of bright red fruits. This is a must-have for any sunny garden. No . . .we mean it . . . this is a MUST have plant!			
108	<i>Clematis virginiana</i>		Virgin's Bower Clematis	Outstanding North American Native clematis for late season blooms. Vigorous climber with deep green foliage and brilliant, white flowers with strong fragrance. Full sun to part shade			
109	<i>Humulus lupulus</i>	Aureus	Common Hop	A golden version of the common hop plant - this is a vigorous herbaceous perennial vine with palmately lobed, chartreuse leaves. Needs some support to climb on. For full sun			
110	<i>Hydrangea anomala subsp. petiolaris</i>	Miranda	Climbing Hydrangea	We have no idea why this plant is not in every garden. The climbing hydrangea is a great plant its own right - glossy dark green leaves, coppery bark, summer blooms - but 'Miranda' adds a bright golden margin to each leaf. Stunning! Best in sun or light shade.

124	<i>Ajuga</i>	Parrot Paradise	Feathered Friends™ Bugleweed	From our friend Chris Hansen of Garden Solutions comes yet another of his fab Ajugas. This 6" tall groundcover offers brilliant gold leaves with burgundy and reddish tips and bright lavender/blue flowers in mid spring. A great deer resistant groundcover for sun or part shade.			
125	<i>Ajuga</i>	Cordial Canary	Feathered Friends™ Bugleweed	Exclusive introduction from Garden Solutions, 'Cordial Canary' makes a tidy little groundcover with fine textured leaves in bright yellow topped with bright bluish spring flowers. Grows to about 4" tall and is surprisingly vigorous for a gold foliage form. Excellent deer resistant groundcover for sun or part shade.			
126	<i>Ajuga reptans</i>	Burgundy Glow	Bugleweed	This groundcover Bugleweed is medium in texture but with leaves flashed in pink, burgundy and white. With pale lavender spring flower spikes.			
127	<i>Alchemilla mollis</i>	Thriller	Lady's Mantle	Thriller is a larger (24") growing selection of the species. Mounds of rich green, ruffled leaves support fresh yellow/green flowers in late spring. Nice cut flower as well as a well-behaved garden plant			
128	<i>Anemone</i>	Macane001	Wild Swan™ Japanese Anemone	Stunning, 18" tall anemone that blooms summer through fall with white blooms (dusted with a bit of lavender) that dance above a mound of fresh green foliage. One of the longest blooming of all the anemones. Great for full sun to light shade. Moderately resistant to deer and rabbit browse.			
129	<i>Aralia cordata</i>	Sun King	Japanese Spikenard	Perennial Plant Association plant of the year for 2020 and a Theodore Klein Award winner as well! This stout perennial will mature to a 4-5' tall and wide "shrub" in the garden with brilliant gold new growth fading to a soft chartreuse later in summer. More shade, more green - more sun, more gold - but not too much sun! Small white flowers in late summer yield glossy black fruit. Fabulous!			

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130	<i>Arisaema thunbergii</i> <i>subsp. urashima</i>		Japanese Cobra Lily	You're either an Arisaema person or you're not. And quite frankly if you're not, we don't understand you! This spectacular relative of our native Jack-in-the-Pulpit sends up truly crazy, horseshoe like leaves to 15" tall with 10-15 leaflets. The deep burgundy colored flower is stunning in color but even more of a conversation piece is the flower hood that elongates into about a foot-long whip leading our friend Tony Avent of Plant Delights Nursery to call it the Dominatrix Jack-in-the-Pulpit!			
131	<i>Asarum maximum</i>	Ling Ling	Panda Face Ginger	A collector's special and conversation piece for the shade garden. Huge leaves (for an Asarum, anyway) to 8" across are dark, leathery green with prominent silver markings above. Flowers are typical "little brown jugs" held below the spring foliage but are huge.			
132	<i>Asarum splendens</i>		Chinese Wild Ginger	One of our favorite clumping groundcovers this one forms mounds of leathery, dark green leaves with silver/white markings. Unique "little brown jug" flowers form in spring below the foliage - getting the kids and neighbors on their knees to check out the flowers is one of the great garden rituals of spring. Deer resistant and long lived shade perennial.			
133	<i>Astilbe</i>	Chocolate Shogun	False Spirea	This unique, 24"-tall, burgundy foliaged astilbe is a standout in the garden. Great for light shade but will take sun as long as it gets adequate moisture. Early summer, relaxed spikes of soft pink blooms form a great contrast with the bronze foliage. Great for massing in the light shade garden. Deer resistant.			
134	<i>Bergenia</i>	Sakura	Dragonfly™ Pig Squeak	Bergenia makes a nice plant in any lightly shaded garden, with its glossy green basal leaves and erect shoots of bright pink flowers. This selection is a more robust grower with heavier flowering and a distinct burgundy cast to the winter foliage			

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135	<i>Bletilla striata</i>	Big Bob	Hardy Ground Orchid	Flower stalks covered in 2" lavender flowers stand well above the bold, bladed foliage of this hardy orchid. The flowers are similar to that of Cattleya orchids.
